Background Information: J*oseph Howe was born on December 13, 1804 and died on June 1st 1873. Throughout his life he* worked and served journalist, publisher, and politician, eventually premier and lieutenant governor of Nova Scotia. He grew up in relatively poor circumstances and was largely self-taught. He was particularly close with his father. He was known for his strong stands in support of responsible government, free speech, and freedom of the press. While he opposed Confederation during the Confederation debates of the 1860s, however he ultimately argued in favor of Confederation and was instrumental in bring Manitoba into Confederation in 1870. The letter below was published anonymously, but Howe had a distinctive writing style and another Halifax-based newspaper, the Evening Express published an article on January 2nd, 1985 suggesting that Howe was behind the anonymous articles.

Featured Source:

"Ever since the Union of the two Provinces, the French Canadians, by sticking together, have controlled the Legislation and the Government of Canada. They will do the same thing in a larger union, and, as the English will split and divide, as they always do, the French members will, in nine cases out of ten, be masters of the situation."
